Is our money safe?

With the most recent banking crisis and

failure of regional banks, I have received emails and inquiries about the safety of the money in our bank accounts.

\$959,106 is invested in United Business Bank CDARS accounts which subdivide our money into CDs of less than \$250,000 and invests them in other banks. Because of this, all the money is FDIC insured. We have one money market account at United Business bank with \$250,487. I need to research whether the \$487 over the \$250,000 is insured and will report to members as soon as I receive a response from my inquiry.

The \$182,00 in our Chase checking and savings account is under \$250,000 and so is FDIC insured. I don't have access to our credit union account, but it is under \$100,000 and so it is insured.

Reserve Fund Strength

Risk of Special Assessment:

High Medium Low

I have found some troubling conditions in Atchison Village's finances that I want to bring to members' attention. The first condition is presented in the reserve study created for AV by Association Reserves, as required by law.

A reserve study provides information to residents about the organization's ability to financially bear the cost of deterioration of its buildings and site. Organizations that are unprepared for large-scale repair projects are considered at risk of having to charge special assessments to keep their buildings habitable and their organization solvent.

Association Reserves recommends that a fully funded reserve fund for AV's age and condition should have almost \$20 million set aside. At the time of the study, the Village had about \$2 million in reserves. As you can see from the graph above, AV is at risk of depleting its reserves and having to charge a special assessment to do the necessary plumbing and electrical work to keep members safe.

Another troubling situation

We have replaced the plumbing and electrical systems in 76 units in the last two years, much of it in emergency situations after years of not repairing leaks and general neglect during Covid. We also replaced plumbing and electrical systems when requested by members who were already paying for remodels, and we began inspecting and replacing the plumbing and electrical system when units were sold.

I researched the state of our total bank balance from February 2022 to February 2023 (parts of 2 board terms) and graphed the results and this is what I found:



Because our total bank balance had dropped a staggering 46%, we discontinued replacing plumbing and electrical systems after inspection when units sell and went back to repairing only catastrophic failures and member-financed remodeling. We discontinued Sal's services, and we will work the budget every month to reduce our expenses. Our financial situation is serious, and it will be painful to resolve. I recognize the large April fee increase is already going to be difficult for many. I am optimistic, though. In my 30 years in the Village, never have I seen members so willing to look at our problems and work together to find solutions.

I am hoping to get a speaker to come to the May board meeting to explain and discuss the reserve study. The election is coming up and addressing our reserve study and deteriorating plumbing and electrical systems will be job one for the new board. John organizes and hosts AV candidates' nights for local politicians, the annual August Richmond Night Out with RPD officers, and has led the monthly Crime Watch meetings for 20 years.

Asked how the Village had changed since the mid-1990s, John said things were generally better.

"There was drug dealing in the park when I arrived, and that's no longer going on." He relies on member input for his Crime Watch newsletter.

"People don't change, really, it's our buildings that have declined," John said. "If we let the Village fall apart, we could lose it. I'd like to see our plumbing better maintained. And there's too much moisture under our units."

John's background is in physics. He was involuntarily retired from BART after seven years for refusing the Covid vaccine. He handled electronics for the BART cars. Earlier he worked for private companies related to the US military on pulse generators and lasers.

His expertise with electronics came from years of broadcast work on local and cable TV and radio, as a camera operator, editor on taped shows, and a guest. He would be glad to assist AV with audio-visual services as needed: just ask the guy for help with microphones, etc.

Banana Oil?

found that the previous residents had lived very different lives here from ours.

For one they had a cat, who spent a couple of weeks making exploratory visits before moving in and taking control of the household.

There also seems to have been two large dogs and other cats. And no dog walker. A strip of backyard along the fence seems to have been used as a pet latrine.
