Panic vs Pragmatism

Some good news about AV's plumbing and electrical replacement costs for the last few months. The ad hoc committee's work and our decision to do major plumbing and electrical jobs cooperatively, rather than using an outside contractor, has reduced the monthly cost of major plumbing and electrical replacements by 1/3 to 1/2.

That reduction, and the fee increase last term, appear to translate into a slight budget surplus each month, rather than a deficit. We are also completing 2 to 4 plumbing and electrical replacement jobs each month, which means we can replace

all plumbing within 10 years at the present rate.

[Last year at this time, I worried about insolvency because we were spending money from our reserves so quickly, and we were having trouble getting accurate financial information. I am cautiously optimistic that both these problems are being addressed and my worry is being replaced by the desire to get our house in order before this board term ends.]

Even though we are showing a slight surplus each month, we're using the money dedicated to funding our reserves for our plumbing and electrical replacements. This ignores the fact that we are going to need to replace roofs, repair dry rot, and paint our buildings.

This year, I hope we can have a clear accounting of our finances and create a longterm plan to fund reserves for major future repair and replacement costs directly and incrementally. I know members want the board to be frugal, but it appears many members care just as much about our long-term financial security. I hope we can work together to have both.
